## St. Louis Author Elinor Coyle Donates Photos, Manuscripts to Library

Ilinor Martineau Coyle, author, lecturer, teacher, photographer and prominent local historian, has donated her St. Louis photograph collection and original manuscripts to the St. Louis Public Library. Many of the photographs were taken to illustrate Ms. Coyle's books on St. Louis' historic homes, landmarks, monuments and other sites. Her books include Old Saint Louis Homes, 1764-1865: The Stories They Tell; Saint Louis: Portrait of a River City; Saint Louis Homes, 1866-1916: The Golden Age; and Saint Louis Treasures.

In the 1960s and '70s, Ms. Coyle pioneered efforts to alert St. Louisans to their area's rich cultural and architectural heritage. Her books helped draw attention to St. Louis' abundant stock of lovely and still useable housing. When Old Saint Louis Homes was first published in 1964, it was one of only two books on St. Louis to be offered to the general public in almost fifty years. It has since gone through a number of editions in the United States and abroad, as have all of Ms. Covle's other books on our city.

According to Glen Holt, executive director of the St. Louis Public Library, "Elinor Coyle's contribution to the preservation of the history and heritage of St. Louis has been considerable. We are pleased and honored to accept her donation as a valued treasure which will enrich not only our own collections, but all the people of St. Louis."

A reception honoring Elinor Coyle will be held on Sunday, January 12, 1992, from 2 to 4 p.m., in the foyer of the Culver Gallery at Central Library, 1301 Olive Street. The reception is free of charge and open to the public. Many of Ms. Coyle's photographs and books will be on display.



MARCH 4 — Breaking the Rules: Reading and Writing Mystery Fiction — Author John Lutz of St. Louis, Missouri. This popular mystery writer will give a brief history of mystery fiction, explain the various categories, then talk about some techniques used in writing the mystery. Mr. Lutz is Winner of the Mystery Writers of America Edgar Award and the Private Eye Writers of America Shamus Award.

APRIL 1 — Connecting Image and History: How Far Can We Go? — William Truettner, Curator for the National Museum of American Art, Smithsonian. Historians use images as documents of the past. Using his "West As America" exhibition at the National Museum of American Art, Dr. Truettner will explore the role of historical images as they relate to the American West.

MAY 6 — The Artist and the Indian: Imaging the Native American — Brian Dippie, Professor of History, University of Victoria, Victoria, BC. Dr. Dippie will provide an illustrated lecture that will focus on 19th and 20th century works — paintings, prints and photographs — and the theme of the "Vanishing Indian."

JUNE 3 — The Full Catastrophe — David Carkeet, Author and Professor of English at University of Missouri – St. Louis, Mr. Carkeet will read from his latest work, THE FULL CATASTROPHE, a comic novel about the language of marriage. The book was a New York Times Notable Book of the Year.

JULY 1 — The African-American in the Middle West — Gerald Early, Professor of English and African & Afro-American Studies, Washington University. Through a comparative analysis of two St. Louisans — William Wells Brown and Henry Armstrong —Dr. Early will focus his talk on the confrontation between black and white culture in two periods of the urban experience in middle America.

AUGUST 5 — East St. Louis: The Rebuilding of a City — Gordon D. Bush, Mayor of East St. Louis, Illinois. Just how difficult is it to rebuild a declining city? With over one year of experience as mayor, Mr. Bush will reveal how he is tackling this massive responsibility.

SEPTEMBER 2 — The West: Exploration, Art, and Science — William Goetzmann, Pro-

fessor of History, University of Texas at Austin. How did the explorers of the American West use the West as scientific laboratory and artistic studio? Using slides of paintings, prints and photographs

will focus on the motives and mind-set that prefaced the voyage of Christopher Columbus in 1492. NOVEMBER 4 — Can Russia Make It—In Spite of Everything?—S. Frederick Starr, President of Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio. The year 1991 has ranked with 1917–1918 as one of the most momentous periods in Russian history. Dr. Starr will discuss the historical attitudes, trends, and traditions that have led to the culture clashes in recent Russian history.
