Fall Workshop: Oral History @ your Library: Using the StoryCorps method to create an oral history collection

Last year, the University City Public Library participated in StoryCorps @ your library. This collaborative oral history project was funded by a grant from StoryCorps, the American Library Association, and the Institute for Museum and Library Services and focused on gathering stories of residents of University City, exploring the history and diversity of the city through the personal stories of its residents and visitors. In this session, Kara Krekeler, reference librarian at the University City Library, and Christa Van Herreweghe, assistant director of the University City Library, will address the StoryCorps method, the collaborative nature of the project, and the general how-to of doing an oral history project, from training to recruiting volunteers to doing the actual recording.

Librarians will learn the nuts and bolts of creating an oral history project, from recruiting volunteers to help record to tracking down people to tell their stories. The session will also include an introduction to the StoryCorps method of interviewing.

Summer Workshop Panel a Hit!

SLRLN hosted their Summer Workshop "Plant the Seeds and Watch Them Grow: Developing Relationships with Your Library's Constituents" at De Smet Jesuit High School on July 12. This well-received workshop was attended by approximately 38 people and featured a varied panel of academic, school, and public librarians, including Sarah Fancher (Saint Louis University), Katie Bava (John Burroughs School), Stacey Lewis (St. Louis County Library) and Alison Griffith (St. Charles City-County Library District). Panelists shared their own best practices for effectively building relationships with their faculty, students, patrons, and community partners, which included the use of well-timed, relatable communication informed by the needs and values of their constituents and building on shared interests by becoming involved in their respective communities. Participants engaged in active learning activities including writing a draft elevator pitch and evaluating a potential library partnership using a Tinder social discovery app model.
