Fall Workshop Recap

St. Louis Regional Library Network and St. Louis Medical Librarians (SLML) co-sponsored the Fall Workshop on Health Care Information on September 21, 2017 at the St. Louis County Library Florissant Valley branch. Here are some tips & take aways that you may find useful:

- The Family Resource Center is a great resource for patrons to call for medical questions: 314.454.2350. They are also open to the public and are hosted by St. Louis Children's Hospital.
- <u>MedlinePlus</u>, a site from the National Institute of Health, is a great resource not only for information on illness and disease, but also for data on drugs and supplements, surgery videos, and health information in over 50 languages, including a complete mirror of the site in Spanish.
- <u>Kidshealth.org</u> includes information that kids and teens can understand on both physical and mental health. It can be a resource for adults looking to assist a child in dealing with difficult emotions and complex questions about things like illness, death, and divorce.
- <u>The Medical Library Association</u> has workshops, webinars, and other resources to train how to assist patrons with consumer health information. Many of these offerings are free.
- <u>Genetics Home Reference</u> can help people make sense of the effects of genetic variation on human health.
- Do you or your patrons suffer from WIMS??? <u>Watch this video to find out</u>.
- The poorest neighborhoods in both St. Louis City and County have the highest health disparities.
- Health information is written above the average adult's reading level (5th-8th grade). Because of this, many Americans do not understand the jargon that is often used. We can figure out the grade level at which something is written by using Microsoft Word and https://readable.io/text/.
